WORD FROM THE DEPUTY

As many of you will remember, coming into college is a pretty daunting experience. Even if you do know some friends who are joining you in Orientation Week, one of the hardest things to do is to walk into that dining room wondering and hoping that someone you know will be in there and that you won't have to sit on your own.

After working in colleges for the past 11 years, I have seen firsthand the lifelong friendships that are made at college. These deep and long lasting friendships are evident years later at the weddings of alumni who stand alongside their college buddies as their bridesmaids and groomsmen. Living in college during these important years of learning how to be an adult, together with all the highs and lows that this brings can be made so much easier being surrounded by like-minded people and the opportunities that college provides.

Janice McCabe, an Associate Professor in Sociology at Dartmouth College recently published a book titled *Connecting in College: How Friendship Networks Matter for Academic and Social Success.* Basing her study on indepth interviews, McCabe discovered that above all, students seek a good balance between their academic and social lives. The lines may often blur, but that can be good. Students check in with friends when they have a paper due, they study together and quiz each other, and they help each other blow off steam when the work is done. The connection between loneliness and depression is obvious and why all of our programs here at Tommy More are based around building relationships and staying connected. You may have noticed that all of our Outreach and Social Justice events are designed to ensure our residents meet the people they are interacting with and have a chance to hear their story.

Our Leadership Programs are designed with an abundance of group work to enable students to widen their support network and form new friendships.

Some of you may have experienced me asking you to move to another table in the dining room so that you are not on your own. This isn't to make it easier for the kitchen staff to clean but to ensure you have the opportunity to have at least one meaningful conversation with another resident during your day.

Lastly, our Inter-Wing competition is designed to ensure you have the opportunity to get out of your room and comfort zone and compete with your neighbours or blockies.

Connection is at the core of what we do and Tommy More students have so many great opportunities to stay connected at college and to make those truly lifelong (bridesmaid type) friendships that last through thick and thin.

FRIENDSHIP: A GREAT GIFT IN LIFE

One of my greatest treasures in life is my friendships. As I was growing up, my parents taught me that good friends are hard to find and should be valued. Later, I learned that friendship is a gift from God and people who come into our lives are not there by coincidence, but rather they are sent from God, who knows our needs.

I remember when I came to Australia as a Refugee from Malaysia after I escaped from Vietnam by boat. Coming here by myself with no friends, family or acquaintances was a lonely experience. I felt homesick for a long period of time but, through English school and the Catholic circle, such as the choir, acquaintances slowly became friends. Some of them became good friends.

They supported me both emotionally and materially. They helped me to get on with my new life here in Australia and with their support, I was able to continue and pursue my vocation in becoming a Catholic priest; a lifelong dream and the reason I fled Vietnam. Had I not escaped, life would have been very different for me.

One of the things that stands out very clearly to me and it is an undeniable fact, that if I did not have such incredible friends, who loved me and supported me throughout the years that I have been in this country, I am sure, that I would not have been able to achieve the things that I have. I attribute my success in life to these wonderful friendships. They are God's special gifts to me.

I would like to share with you a story of a beautiful friend that I have. I met him when I was studying Moral Theology in Rome. He came to Rome from the United States, in order to attend the beatification of Fr. Francis Seelos, C.Ss.R (one of our Redemptorist confreres), whom Pope John Paul II beatified in St. Peter's Square in Rome on April 9, 2000.

His name is Binh TA; he is also a Redemptorist priest from Houston, Texas. From the moment we met, somehow we clicked. We talked and shared quite openly about ourselves, our interests and hobbies, and our ministries as priests. During his time in Rome, I remembered the first thing I did was to introduce him to the taste of baguettes (a long thin loaf of French bread) and blue cheese, which we ate and drank with red wine. This was something new to Binh and he really enjoyed it. I also took him around and showed him how beautiful Rome is, so I became his tour guide of sorts.

Later on, near the end of 2000, Binh invited me to visit him in the city of New Orleans, Louisiana. We had a wonderful time while we were working together at our Redemptorist Community in New Orleans. We also took time out to visit other famous places in different parts of America. Five years ago (2014), we were able to meet again in Seattle, where I visited my eldest sister's family. Luckily Binh was there as the local superior of the Redemptorist Community in Seattle, so I was able to catch up with him once again. This time, we decided to visit New York to see the Statue of Liberty and the beautiful city of New York.

Although, both of us live on different continents and are very far away from one other, we are somehow still connected and close. Whenever we have a chance to speak on the phone with one another, we feel so happy. We reminisce about all of our beautiful stories and memories that we have built over the years. We do love each other with a brotherly love in our priesthood and as close friends we support one another, especially when one of us may feel a bit down, due to the pressure of our life or due to our ministry.





I thank God for the beautiful friendship that I have with Binh and with many others, whom have been very significant in my life. My close friends mean a lot to me, and I will always uphold and treasure their friendship.

Friendship is a gift, a wonderful gift from God, but they do need to be cultivated and nurtured, so they can grow beautifully. Please do not take the gift of friendship for granted; treasure it with the utmost care and respect.

It may be in geographical distance but never in heart and mutual support. So, it doesn't really matter how long ago since we last saw each other, our conversation instantly picks up on the topic where we left off the last time. It is magical.

I'd like to summarise our friendship with three simple quotes: the first from Eleanor Roosevelt, "Many people will walk in and out of your life, but only true friends will leave footprints in your heart." Another from Helen Keller, "I would rather walk with a friend in the dark, than alone in the light." And, the last from Proverbs (27:9): "A sweet friendship refreshes the soul."

I indeed thank God for refreshing my soul, through my dear friend, Fr. Peter Tran.

Our Indigenous students are proud of their culture and were even more thrilled with the response.

At the beginning of the week, a packed room listened intently as our Aboriginal students shared their culture, beliefs and values, gave an honest account of what life is like living as an indigenous student.

Profiles of our students were placed in the Singleton Recreation Room letting others know their family lines and heritage, and inviting other students on campus to come for a yarn.

Lastly, for the entire week, Chris and his kitchen provided some Indigenous flair with fusion dishes that gave students the chance to try ingredients such as kangaroo, crocodile and wattle seed. BEYOND STUDIES: CAREERS' WEEK

Participate. This was the core theme of the inaugural Careers' Week at St Thomas More College from 5 - 11 August, where students received first class support and alumni guidance into what steps they could take to stand out from the crowd once they graduate.

A common theme from all experts was that aside from good grades, what often differentiates star candidates is their commitment to extra-curricular activities, and in particular volunteer work such as Outreach and Social Justice Activities, as well as taking up leadership and mentoring opportunities.

Panelists commented that with the competitive nature of the job market, it is often these students who also demonstrate good social responsibility and being a teamplayer that secure employment following graduation.

The week commenced with a Bright Breakfast, led by Head of College, Tom Mitchell, and Principal of Sacred Heart College (and Alumni), Peter Bothe. During the workshop, Tom and Peter, along with Manager of Marketing and Alumni Relations, Robyn Birkin, fielded questions from students about how to succeed in securing employment, all the way from the do's and dont's of writing job applications to winning interviews. Students agreed that this insight was invaluable.

During the week, several guides on how to lay out, prepare and write applications, and interview well, were distributed to students and uploaded to the new student portal. A number of staff made themselves available to review resumes and cover letters for students, and several students chose to take up this opportunity. Later in the week, St Thomas More College welcomed back alumni, Caroline Guimelli and Laura Tieri to talk about their careers in healthcare at a second Bright Breakfast. In 2019 just under a quarter of St Thomas More College students were studying a health related discipline, from psychology to medicine, sport science to nursing so it was a popular session that gave insight into securing employment upon graduation including alternate employment pathways, how to give a good impression and get the most from your practical experience, and how to effectively liaise with other disciplines and departments within your workplace.

Lastly, students had a fun session with members of St Vincent de Paul Op Shops and Community Services, who came armed with a rack of clothes to conduct a workshop with students, arming them with tips on dressing for success (on a budget).

The College is very grateful to the alumni who lent their assistance over the course of this week, and hopes to grow the event in 2020.


With sharks and stingrays floating above, students looked glamorous as usual, as they had the chance to dress up and enjoy one another's company outside the walls of Tommy More.

What a year 2019 has been for this ever growing and outstanding program.

The Outreach and Social Justice program grows, develops and improves each year and this year was no exception. As each new leader comes into this daunting position of Outreach and Social Justice Resident Advisor, they bring with it something new but we all have the same sole purpose of refining and building upon the strong foundations built and formed from previous years.

Tommy is increasingly recognised for going above and beyond in the community. This year St Thomas More College won the Residential Students Department (RSD) Community Cup. The RSD organises community events throughout the year including Relay for Life, Red Bull's Wings for Life fun run, beach clean ups, tree planting and more. Tommy had the highest number of participants and money raised overall for all 5 colleges which was an astounding accomplishment.

With the events that were fundraising based, Tommy as a collective raised over \$12,000 towards numerous charitable organisations in our community. For such a small number of people we made an incredible difference. Throughout the year it has been amazing to watch and witness so many acts of kindness, compassion and respect shown by our residents. Besides continuing and developing the programs established over the last few years, I introduced our (hopefully continuing) annual Pink Ribbon Lady's Brunch. This raised over \$1,300 towards breast cancer research. The day consisted of lots of food and drinks, incredible live performances from ex-Collegians and the St George's all girl a cappella group which was wonderful. There were games and raffles donated by many local businesses helping to make the day a huge success.

The Outreach and Social Justice Celebration Evening was our way to show our appreciation towards all the residents who participated in an outreach event throughout the year. We also invited special guests from the events and organisations we teamed up with. A representative from Red Frogs, Red Bull Wings for Life team and a member from Edmund Rice Camps for Kids all joined us for the evening. We awarded medals to those that went above and beyond at each major outreach event. The Outreach and Social Justice Award for 2019 went to Andrew Italiano for his commitment to each and every event he did and for the copious amount of extra work he did behind the scenes. Andrew is an amazing person. He approached every event and task I gave him with a smile and willingness to help.

It has truly been an absolute honour to be the Outreach and Social Justice Resident Advisor of 2019. It filled my heart with pride to witness each event organised for the College and seeing all the residents in their elements helping others and giving back. I have personally seen this make a difference to not just the people who are receiving the donations and help, but to see the residents gain appreciation and respect towards people from all walks of life. This program is hugely beneficial in so many respects. I thank Tom and Bec sincerely for all they have allowed me to achieve with this program.

2019 OUTREACH ACHIEVEMENTS

This year 18 events were organised, and each was a huge success. We had 98 residents participate in one or more of these outreach events throughout the year. That is over 25% of the student population volunteering to be involved!

These events included:

- Our first ever Big Tommy Garage Sale which raised nearly \$3,000 towards our annual Cambodia Collaboration. This was part of more than \$21,000 raised throughout the year to support vulnerable children in Cambodia.
- World's Greatest Shave that raised over \$5,000 and had seven residents shave their heads, six boys wax something from a leg to a chest, and three dye their hair all to raise money and awareness for the Leukaemia Foundation.
- Red Bull's Wings for Life Fun Run which was very popular.
- The famous Ronald McDonald House visits which allowed 60 residents to cook for and entertain the families and children staying during their difficult times at the Perth Children's Hospital.
- HBF Run for a Reason assisting with distributing water on the half marathon leg.
- Organised blood drives which were an inspiration. 16 residents donated blood or plasma to the Red Cross Foundation. Just one donation can save up to three lives, so all up those residents saved up to 48 lives.
- A Pink Ribbon Breast Cancer Brunch.


2019 Inter-College Sport was a great success, with the skill that Tommy is so well known for on the sporting field.



Initiatives included the Memory Lane Morning Tea (a new annual event for Alumni who were at the College in 1980 or prior), the Alumni Facebook Group, new Alumni Portal, as well as a variety of group and 1:1 career mentoring opportunities between students and Alumni.

Head of College, Tom Mitchell, then discussed ways in which Alumni can get involved, including the announcement of a forthcoming Endowment Fund.

St Thomas More College is often approached by Alumni who are keen to contribute towards scholarships for students who require financial assistance to study at Tommy More. Additionally, a number of our neighbouring colleges are already running well-established funds. In short, in order to remain competitive, we must develop our offerings.

Until now however, the College has not had the resources to properly develop and manage the ability to receive funds. For the past two years, behind the scenes, the College has worked in consultation with a number of former Student Club Committee Presidents to plan how a scholarship fund might look and function, and from May 2020, we look forward to touching base with Alumni to discuss more details about giving back.
